Managed by Dauphin County Parks and Recreation Department, Wildwood Park is one of Pennsylvania's premier centers for environmental studies, educational opportunities and outdoor recreation. This public resource is located in the rolling hills of central Pennsylvania on the outskirts of downtown Harrisburg.

115,000 people use the Park annually. Its 229 acres are a haven for countless species of flora and fauna centered around the 90-acre freshwater wetland. A popular three-mile loop trail encircles the park with side trails and boardwalks for a total of six miles of trails.


